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

(TS/ (NF) Attached is our final report on CIA-controlled detention facilities operated under the 17 September 2001 Memorandum of Notification. Recommendation 1 is directed to you. Please provide me a written response within 60 days setting forth the actions that have been taken to implement the recommendation and/or a timetable for eventual implementation. (U) All of the recommendations in the report are considered significant. The status of the recommendations, as well as corrective actions taken to address them, will be included—in an appropriately sanitized way—in the Inspector General's next semiannual report to the Director, Central Intelligence Agency. This audit responds to a recommendation in the Classified Annex to the Joint Explanatory Statement of the Committee of Conference accompanying the Intelligence Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2002 that the Central Intelligence Agency Inspector General audit each covert action program at least every three years.
